

- ✓ Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs)
- ✓ Other International Mitigation Purposes (OIMPs)

Authorization

- > A host country authorizes:
 - $\checkmark\,$ ITMOs for use towards the achievement of an NDC,
 - ✓ ITMOs for use for other international mitigation purposes
- > A host country needs to specify a <u>"first transfer":</u>
 - ✓ For use towards the achievement of an NDC, the first international transfer of the mitigation outcome
 - ✓ For use for OIMPs, (1) the authorization, (2) the issuance, or (3) the use or cancellation of the mitigation outcome
